OBJECTIVE

The road accidents often involve severe injuries to internal organs resulting in excessive bleeding which is the cause of death. The associated shock may also prove fatal. In case of head injuries, faster the medical attention higher is the chance of survival. In a developing country like India, amongst many factors, the average response time for an arrival of an ambulance to the accident site is unpredictable – firstly on account of shortage of ambulances and secondly, the non-availability of the facility across the country, thereby considerably reducing the survival chances of the accident victim. The other key aspect is with regard to availability of trained manpower to act as "First Responders" to provide pre-hospital care to the accident victims.

This Session will focus on the need of improving systems of Trauma Care and the efforts being done by the Apex Trauma Centre of India to reduce the burden of road traffic fatalities in the country.
